Q: How long have you been lobstering?

A: Probably since I was four years old

Q: What other members of your family lobster?

A: My dad and my little brother Daigan.

Q: Who do you go lobstering with?

A: My dad and his boss.

Q: How often do you go out in a week?

A: About three or four times a week.

Q: What months do you lobster in?

A: A lot in the summer and a little in the winter.

Q: Where do you fish?

A: Pretty far out, and around Cushing and the Saint George River.

Q: How deep, do you know?

A: I don't know, usually about 10 to 20 fathoms.

Q: How do you know where to set your traps?

A: We just know.

Q: What is your job on the boat? Describe it.

A: I band and bait the bags and do a few strings every once in a while.

Q: When does your day begin, and when does it end?

A: It begins usually about 4:30 and ends usually anytime in the afternoon from 1:00 to 3:00.

Q: What color is your lobster buoy?

A: My dad's are green and white.

Q: What do you use for bait? Where do you get it?

A: We use pogies and mackerel. We get them right from the wharf that we sell the lobsters at.

Q: Who do you sell your lobsters to?

A: We sell our lobsters to John Olson.

Q: How many traps do you set?

A: A lot.

Q: How many traps do you pick up in a day?

A: Usually around 200 or 300.

Q: What is the biggest lobster you ever caught?

A: About 9 inches.

Q: How big is a trap? How heavy is a trap?

A: About 3 to 4 feet long and weighs about 40 pounds.

Q: How do you keep from getting pinched by the lobsters claws?

A: There's a special way of grabbing them. It's kind of hard to explain.

Q: What size lobsters are you allowed to keep? How do you measure them?

A: You can keep them if they are 3 1/4 inches to 5 inches. You measure them with a measure.

Q: Why do some lobsters have a v-notch in their tail? What do you do with them?

A: It means it is a mother and it has had eggs, so you have to throw it back.

Q: What happens if you get caught with a short lobster or a v-notched lobster?

A: First, you get a warning; then if you get caught again, you either get a fine or you lose your license. If your boat gets checked and you are 15 and under and there is nothing wrong, you get a free ice cream at MacDonalds.

Q: What other kinds of sea life do you encounter while you are lobstering?

A: We encounter dolphins, porpoises, seals, sea stars, and fish.

Q: Where do you sell your lobsters, and whose wharf is it?

A :We sell our lobsters to Blue Water Seafood. It is John Olson's wharf.

Q: Describe your boat. How long is your boat? What color is it?

A: Our boat is 37 feet long, and it is green and white.

Q: What is your boat's name? Why is it named this?

A: Its name is the *Lisa Marie*. It is named that because it is my dad's boss's wife's name.

Q: What do you use for a bathroom on the boat?

A: We use a bucket, or we just go over the back.

Q: What do you wear when you go lobstering?

A: We wear oil pants.

Q: Do you ever use toggles? Explain what a toggle does.

A: Of course. Everyone uses toggles. Toggles help the rope stay off the bottom so your traps don't get stuck on the bottom.

Q: Where do you put the lobsters when you have caught them?

A: Sometimes we put them in crates and in a big tank.

Q: How do you know where to go in the fog? What electronics do you have?

A: We have a radar, and my dad's boss knows where to go.

Q: What safety equipment do you have?

A: We have lifejackets, a raft.

Q: Have you ever fallen overboard? Explain how.

A: I have never fallen overboard, but I have been thrown over before.

Q: Have you ever gotten seasick before?

A: No!

Q: Has your boat ever broken down at sea? Describe what happened.

A: Yes, but I wasn't on it, so I don't know what happened.

Q: Has your boat ever been hung up on something or run aground? Describe what happened?

A: No.

Q: Have you ever lost a trap or bait bag while hauling? Explain what happened.

A: We lose bait bags sometimes, but my dad gets them before they are too deep, and we never lose traps.

Q: What is the scariest thing that has ever happened to you?

A: Nothing scary has ever happened to me.

Q: What is your favorite thing about lobstering?

A: Money and spending time with my dad.

Q: What do you like least about it?

A: Nothing.

Q: How do you like to eat lobsters, and how often do you eat them?

A: I like lobsters soaked in butter. I eat them a lot.
