- [00:00] Born Merasheen Island 1948; :Moved to St. John's when ten years old; Visited Merasheen at holidays until age 16/17 when Island resettled in 1966, people moved to places like Marystown, St. John's, Trepassey—most in Placentia area;
- [02:10]Father and brothers were fishermen, used cod traps; Seasonal aspects of fishing; Lumbering around Christmas time; Family-oriented aspects of fishing; Salt fishery in younger days;
- [03:50] Children helped with fish processing; Steps in fish processing; Fish were sold to big fish merchants—changes in how this took place; Wareham's (fish merchant);
- [05:30]Men only spent much time in the home when not fishing or lumbering; Some men signed on as crew members for others—called it "shipping to"; Some men slept in bunkhouses provided, others like her father's crowd had own premises; Did not perceive fishing as dangerous, because spent life on boats, swam in harbor in late August when not much fishing/uncles would be on bank watching out for them when taking a break from fixing nets, etc.; Spending time in twine loft after school, watching father/uncles repair nets, listen to them sing songs, tell stories; Interesting old things in twine loft from other places brought back from fishing trips; Picking berries in the fall, freezing them in water, chopping them out to use
- [11:59]Going squidging in teen years—form of teen courtship; Explanation of squidging; Portuguese and Spanish ate the squid, they used some as bait on hand lines; Women's roles—always involved in processing, now more women on trawlers since Canadian government recognized women as fishermen and they could draw unemployment; Married in 1977, noticed women starting to get in boats around that time; Vicky Silk's lawsuit in Newfoundland to get unemployment benefits along with husband—led to more women taking on traditionally male jobs in her community of South East Bight; Improvements in quality control of fish; Changes from selling fish salted to fresh/frozen;
- [18:00] Family always sang—father and his brothers, mother and her sisters; Mother from Tack's Beach; Singing, dancing, telling stories was form of entertainment on Merasheen/had no electricity; Started listening to radios more and more as became affordable—picked up U.S. station relayed from naval base in Argentia; Placentia and Argentia accents—story of Aunt always trying to correct for that; St. John's waterfront vibrant when moved there—vessels from all over world, fishermen would come in and shop for families; Father social person, in British Navy during war, would invite sailors home for dinner; Statue of Our Lady of Fatima in Cathedral of St. John, carried up the hill by Portuguese fishermen;
- [23:25] Foreign vessels in little ports, like Harbour Buffett—come in to purchase, sell; Liked seeing the names on the vessels, hear fishermen sing, play

concertinas/accordions; Very interested in history and oral history, culture today so pervaded by electronic media not spreading Newfoundland items for most part; Hopes young people will listen to old tunes and songs and make their own; Involvement with Figgy Duff; Pamela Morgan; English/Scottish roots of "Newfoundland" songs;

[29:35]Difference between "traditional singer" like her mother, and her who sings for audiences/pay; Women very strong in Newfoundland culture but song canon doesn't really reflect that; Enjoys sing songs about women working; Women's involvement in fishery at home though only men got paid/had name on books; Women's involvement in Maritime Institute in St. John's; Took a celestial navigation course at Maritime Institute; Women in Labrador Straits doing inshore fishing long before 1970s; Labrador Straits fishermen from Newfoundland—"floaters" who stored fish on boat and "stationarys" who had places on land to process fish; Michael Crummey's book *Hard Light* about Labrador fishery;
