ABSTRACT

Antonio Perreira also known as "Tony the Plumber," has worked as a full-time pipe fitter on the waterfront since 1976. Originally from Portugal, he learned is trade through a traditional apprenticeship after working as a pinner in a textile mill and as a construction worker and laborer. He has serviced both scallopers and draggers in the New Bedford fleet for the past 34 years, primarily working with Portuguese owned vessels. He talks about his childhood in Portugal, his experience immigrating to New Bedford at the age of 13 and his work history. He discusses the impact of regulations on his waterfront plumbing work and the idea that fishermen should be allowed to retire after a set number of years fishing, regardless of their age because the work is so physically demanding.
