ABSTRACT

Bernice Calnan of New Bedford is a fisherman's daughter, wife, mother and grandmother of fishermen and scallopers. Her parents came from Newfoundland. Her husband is now retired, her sons continue to fish and own boats. She talks about growing up in a fishing family and gives a good sense of the New Bedford fishing community in the 1960s. She was an active member of the New Bedford Fishermen's Wives which was instrumental in protesting to get the 200 mile limit. She discusses closes calls, safety at sea, changes in technology and parenting.
